Carol Velasques Richardson holds several cultural and artistic positions in Alachua County. Ms. Velasques Richardson is the Program Coordinator of the A. Quinn Jones Museum and Cultural Center in Gainesville, Florida. The A. Quinn Jones Museum & Cultural Center, housed in the former Jones Family home at 1013 NW 7th Avenue in Gainesville serves as a tribute to one of the most influential educators in the history of Alachua County. The Museum features a permanent exhibit on "Prof" Jones, the people and places of the Fifth Avenue/Pleasant Street neighborhood, and houses a collection of oral histories centering on the African-American experience in Gainesville. The rest of the space will host rotating exhibits.

She is a Board Member of the Arts Council of Alachua County, Advisory Board Member with WUFT TV/Classic 89, University of Florida, Chair, City of Alachua's Parks Recreation and Culture, Theater Director and Station Manager of WUBA 88.1 FM, High Springs, Florida.

Ms. Velasques Richardson's career in the performing arts began in the early 90s as an actress and then shifted to Multidisciplinary Arts and Culture management. She has directed 50 adult and children's theater and film productions particularly examining race and culture in America such as "Fences," "The Amistad Case," "Cat on Hot Tin Roof," "In Splendid Error: The Frederick Douglas and Captain John Brown Story," "Dreamgirls", "Grandmothers," just to name a few. Carol's other productions have included: "Smokey Joe's Café," "To Kill A Mockingbird," "Phantom of the Op'ry," "A Lesson Before Dying," "The Amen Corner: A James Baldwin Journey." "Sven Guitars," "The Piano Lesson" "Blues for An Alabama Sky" 'The Wiz of Oz" Hurold and the Purple Crayon and many more in Florida and Georgia."

Ms. Velasques-Richardson was successful in receiving a grant from the Florida Humanities Council to bring to life the story of famed African American Educator Mary McLeod Bethune to Life.
